

Reconnect Community Projects

The Reconnect community grant supports creative community-led projects that build new and deeper relationships, especially for people that are isolated.

In 2022, 15 projects were supported.

All the projects were focused on connecting and reconnecting neighbours and community members of many backgrounds and ages through events, education and awareness activities, workshops, sharing culture through food etc. The activities brought old and new faces together through:

- → Community kitchens/intercultural potlucks (Indian, Nigerian and Sierra Leone food)
- → Popup concerts with arts activities and games
- → Art classes in the park
- → Community connect coffee and conversation
- → Basketball events
- → Newcomer Youth Skate Night
- → Block Party
- → Collective kitchen Samosas project
- → Sudanese Youth Project
- → Workshops on topics such as "Healing Together", "diversity and cultural heritage" etc.
- → Community Garden

All grantees also completed a 5-week Community Leadership Program, where they shared lessons and challenges as they ran their projects, on how to know who is in your community, reach new people, deepen relationships, and host activities that are welcoming to all. There are now many new citizen leaders that have continued to create community far beyond their projects.

Example of impact

When a woman in midlife is overwhelmed with anxiety, feeling the stresses of Covid and seeing her mental health plummet, having lost her professional employment and fearful of her marriage falling apart, I'm glad she could be offered help at a time when she could not begin to afford the true cost of assistance. Change began quickly as she felt that she was understood by her counsellor. There was opportunity to help her sort what was and wasn't her responsibility. She could move from the fear of "what if" to address what is. She described learning to speak up for herself... In fact she's feeling optimistic about taking the next steps that will prepare her for some positive change."

From a counselor:

"A couple in their mid-30s attended counselling and presented with blended family problems. The husband and the wife both had different cultural backgrounds. The wife was Filipino, and the husband was Dominican. Part of their cultural differences contributed to their couple conflict. Co-parenting their individual children together was a struggle. The clients were unable to discuss co-parenting without becoming reactive towards each other. They were able to understand and validate each other's perspectives during the counselling process. They participated in communication exercises and homework. Eventually they were able to improve their reactivity management, which allowed them to come together and engage in effective communication. They also learned about their corresponding parenting styles and what style is the most effective. They were able to reach their counselling goals and the counselling process was completed."



Indigenous Projects

In 2022, funded projects served 1,246 self-identified Indigenous community members across the Indigenous funding stream and 14% reported feeling a greater sense of belonging in the Indigenous community.



Example of impact

From a senior to a volunteer:

"You guys coming to my door gives me a reason to get dressed each day!"

"A referral to the Home Support Program came through the Brain Injury Network to help support a senior male in his early 60's who was unable to keep his small 1-bedroom apartment clean due to his brain injury. The client had been given notice of eviction if the apartment was not clean. We sent in two. workers to give the apartment a thorough cleaning and then set him up with regular a Home Support Worker to help maintain the home with general housekeeping as well as setting up reminders to take out the garbage. The client was not evicted from the apartment and continues to receive regular Home Support visits....."
