Alberta Health subdivided Red Deer into three distinct zones (North, South and East). The data presented is an average of Alberta Health's three zones in which it divides Red Deer (East, North, South). Based on Statistics Canada data, Red Deer's population was 100,418 in 2016; Alberta Health uses a Red Deer population of 112,414 (as of 2016) as it uses a slightly larger geographic boundary.
